### Williamson Act & Rangeland Production



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### Williamson Act

- California Land Conservation Act of 1965 (Williamson Act).
- One of the nation's oldest agricultural conservation incentive programs.
- To preserve agricultural and open space lands by encouraging landowners to stay in agricultural production through reduced property tax rates.
- Landowners voluntarily commit to maintaining their land in agricultural production under a local county contract for a minimum of 10 years.
- The economic success of agriculture in California is intertwined with the Williamson Act.



### Williamson Act

- Via the Open Space Subvention Act of 1971, the State of California provided local governments with annual subvention funds to cover forgone property tax revenues.
- Contract-holding counties received annual subvention payments from the state in proportion to their enrollment and to the productivity of the enrolled lands.
- These payments have been suspended in recent years due to revenue shortfalls.
- Contract-holding counties are wrestling with if and how to continue these contracts.


## Analysis reveals potential rangeland impacts if Williamson Act eliminated

- Wetzel et al. explored the economic and ecological impacts if counties eliminate Williamson Act contracts.
- With CA Cattlemen's Association sent a mail survey to 702 CCA members in 33 counties.
- 52% Response rate.
- 67% of respondents held rangeland contracts in Williamson Act.

 91% reported Williamson Act was "very" to "extremely" important for the long-term viability of their ranching operation.



## Summary

- Williamson Act funding is the most widely used conservation incentive program by CA ranchers

   there is not a close second.
- Williamson Act savings may make a critical difference in turning a profit versus taking a loss for the majority of California ranchers.
- Profitability is required for rangeland production and conservation win-wins to occur.
- Funding Williamson Act is a difficult issue, but its conservation value on rangelands is real.
