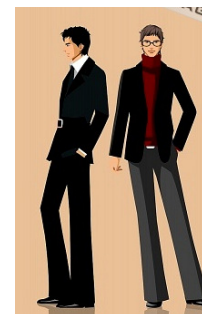
FASHION REVUE AND STYLE SHOW

WORKING WITH TEEN LEADERS

Teen Leader. It's a title and a role long embraced in the 4-H Youth Development Program. We believe that young people not only learn and grow from leading, but that our projects and programs are stronger because of it. Some tips for working with our teen partners:

- **Clarify expectations.** Before beginning your work together, take time to discuss what you expect from each other. Teens need to know the specifics about their commitment. Outline the expectations, time commitment, and benefits (e.g. skills gained, service hours granted) of the position. Be sure to ask teens what they expect from you and what they think they need to do their job well. Let them know what they can expect from you. Use this dialogue at the beginning of your work together as a touchstone if misunderstandings occur.
- **Create a plan together.** It's not your place to lead the project, nor is it the teen's responsibility. In orchestrating the project, together you should make decisions about what will happen, who will do it, and how it will be done. Meet with teen leaders to map out the program year. Teens bring a different perspective, and encouraging their participation and assigning responsibilities early only strengthens your program. Don't holdback on offering your ideas. Listen, but also coach.
- **Build a relationship.** Get to know the teens you're working with and allow them to know you. Phone calls to check in, notes of appreciation, and genuine interest in their lives helps insure success and solidifies their commitment.
- **Help teens to organize.** Organizational skills vary among individuals, but teens generally have less experience in pulling things together. Adults should regularly check with the teens to ensure plans are in place and explore with teens any problems they may not foresee. Adults bring experience teens haven't yet acquired.
- **Have high expectations.** Believe in teen leaders and know they can produce. Communicate this belief through your words and behavior. Recognize and support their limitations. Remember, teens do not have the same access to resources as adults. School schedules, transportation, and money for materials—all these things need to be considered when teens commit to leadership roles. Be patient as they learn, but don't be afraid to give guidance to help them improve.
- **Evaluate, affirm, and recognize.** Reflection is an important element in learning, and together teen leaders and adults should evaluate their project's goals, direction, and progress. Young leaders also should have the chance to reflect upon their role in the project and their effectiveness. For teens as well as adults, a little praise goes a long way. Give feedback on their work, encourage them, acknowledge their strengths, and celebrate their success, both formally and informally. But don't over praise. It can sound patronizing if out of proportion to the teen's work.

TEEN NIGHT SLATED FOR MAY 13TH

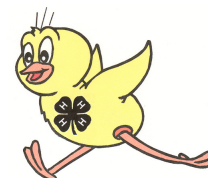

Mariposa County Horse & Pony Project News

Mariposa County Fair Horse Show Committee has added two riding classes for 4H/FFA/Independent youth members to the Fair Horse show which takes place on August 20, 2011. Check the Fair Exhibitor book for uniform requirements for Showmanship and remember although uniforms are not required for 4H/FFA/Independent riding classes, helmets are.

Chowchilla Jr Fair Horse Show changed from April 23 to Sunday April 17th. Look for entries at www.chowchillafair.org web site by March 1st. In order to show at this fair you needed to show proof to your leader that you owned/leased your horse 120 days prior to April 17th and your leader will need to sign off on any entries. Also, check the rule book for specifics as this fair requires white pants for showmanship!

Mariposa Mountain Riders have donated \$235 to 4-H Horse & Pony County Project and Catheys Valley Horse & Pony project. Division of funds was based on the number of members in those respective projects as of December 2010. **THANKS** to the Mariposa Mountain Riders for their continued support of 4H!

Teen leaders Jocelynn Barrington and Katy Casner, along with Junior Leader, Elseana Skowronski, put some of our level 1 and level 2 students through **basic skills testing** on Sunday February 20. After lunch we had a brief discussion on colors and markings and went through the uses of different Western and English saddles. Leader Carol Suggs went over the typical bit phases involved in training a Western horse which included transitioning from the snaffle, to the bosal, to the two-rein and finally bridle. Those in attendance went through three boxes of magazines, books and misc. horse items that were donated by Michelle Tomerlin. WHAT IS 4-H SET?

4-H science, engineering, and technology projects encompass a wide variety of subjects and topics.

- **Animal Science**
- **Biological Science** including embryology, entomology, marine biology, and veterinary science
- **Consumer and Family Science** including textiles, fiber science, and kitchen science
- **Earth Science** including astronomy, climatology, forestry, outdoor adventure, and water education
- **Physical Science** including energy management, sustainability, and geology
- **Plant Science** including agriculture and gardening
- **Environmental Education**
- **Engineering and Technology** including website design, computers, gis/gps, and video production, aerospace, electricity, electronics, robotics, engines, and woodworking

All 4-H SET projects should contain these elements:

- Activities follow the **Experiential Learning Cycle**: After the activity, the facilitator leads youth through a period of reflection where the learner shares and processes the experience and applies new learning in authentic situations.
- Activities promote **Inquiry Learning using Effective Questioning**: Through learning experiences, youth are encouraged to think, explore, question, and make decisions. Youth build understanding by exploration and questioning.
- Provides opportunities to improve **Science, Engineering, and Technology Abilities (Processes)**: Engages youth in science, engineering and technology through one or more of the science, engineering, and technology processes.
- Anchored in a **Positive Youth Development Context**: Positive youth development occurs from an intentional process that provides youth opportunities to learn new skills, experience independence and develop concern for others in a positive learning environment. Contextualizing SET learning experiences within a positive youth development framework is critical in helping youth learn, grow, and contribute to their communities.
- Facilitated and delivered with **Adult Mentors who Partner with Youth**: Learning experiences are led by trained, caring adult staff and volunteers acting as mentors, coaches, facilitators and co-learners who operate from a perspective that youth as partners and resources in their own development.
- Programs offer **Extended Learning Opportunities**: Projects offer long-term experiences to significantly increase youth knowledge, skills and attitudes. Experiences are designed for extended frequency and duration that serve to build learning over time.
- Based on **National Science Education Standards**: SET activities delivered through inquiry-based learning focusing on concepts of physical science, life science, earth and space science, science and technology, science in personal and social perspectives, history and nature of science.
